



# NCAPP Mission





# Highlights in NC Public School AP Data

- ▶ North Carolina saw growth in all three major categories of AP Participation and Performance:
  - ▶ 3.7 % increase of exam takers over last year (69,957 students, ↑ 22% over past 2 yrs)
  - ▶ 3.6 % increase of exams taken over last year (129,538 exams, ↑ 23% over past 2 yrs)
  - ▶ 4.6 % increase of examinees scoring 3+ over last year (66,646 exams, ↑13% over past 2 yrs)

American Indian includes Alaska Native, Black includes African American and Pacific Islander includes Native Hawaiian. Students reported as “Two or more races” are non-Hispanic.

# AP Participation: Proven Benefits

AP students with an average AP Exam score of:

- 1  are 2–6 percentage points higher
- 2  are 7–11 percentage points higher
- 3  are 12–16 percentage points higher
- 4  are 17–22 percentage points higher
- 5  are 23–27 percentage points higher

in expected on-time college graduation rate compared to academically matched peers who don't take an AP Exam.

# AP Exam Performance

- ▶ **54 % of public school AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam in May 2016**
  - **26% of Native American examinees scored 3 or higher.**
- ▶ **Represents 37,839 public school students, compared to 36,427 in 2015 and 29,361 in 2012.**




Advanced Placement Participation by District: High School Class of 2009



AP<sup>®</sup> Participation by District: Class of 2015



Percent of graduating class earning a 3 or higher on at least one AP exam during high school




