


2010 AMERICAN INDIAN ALONE POPULATION

Dr. Ben Chavis, Former Principal, American Indian Public Charter School – Dr. Chavis is an outspoken leader in the education reform movement and former principal. His tenure as the principal at American Indian Public Charter School was both successful in raising performance and enrollment and controversial for his methods. Author of *Crazy Like a Fox: One principal's triumph in the inner city*, Dr. Chavis is now Chief Executive in charge of training and implementing the successful American Indian Public Charter School model in schools.



Christy Crouse, Regional Director, Dolly Parton's Imagination Library – Mrs. Crouse serves as a Regional Director for the Dollywood Foundation's Imagination Library. Started in 1996 by Dolly Parton, the library distributes free age appropriate children's books. Ms. Crouse has an MA in Family Studies from NOVA Southeastern University in Sarasota (FL) and a BA in Psychology from the University of Virginia College in Wise (VA).



Dr. Amy Locklear Hertel, Director, American Indian Center, UNC Chapel Hill – Dr. Hertel directs the American Indian Center at UNC Chapel. Designed to advance the University's overall mission of research, teaching and public service, Dr. Hertel seeks to improve the social economic conditions of American Indian families and communities. She has earned degrees in social work and law from Washington University in St. Louis.



Dr. Olivia Oxendine, Member, North Carolina State Board of Education – Dr. Oxendine has an extensive record in public education teaching reading, social studies, and English in three states; directing curricular programs at the central office level; serving as a school administrator in elementary and middle grades; and directing state-level programs in dropout prevention, the NC DARE program, school nursing, and school social work. In South Carolina and North Carolina, she has served on numerous committees established to improve K-12 writing instruction. Dr. Oxendine holds degrees from UNC Pembroke, Appalachian State University, and UNC Greensboro.



Dr. Johnny Hunt, Superintendent, Public Schools of Robeson County – Dr. Hunt has been a teacher, assistant principal, principal, executive director, assistant superintendent and superintendent with the Public Schools of Robeson County (and Robeson County Schools prior to merger) for over 30 years. He has received numerous awards and recognitions for outstanding performance and dedication to improving educational outcomes for all students. Dr. Hunt holds an Ed.D. degree in Educational Leadership with a minor in Special Education from Fayetteville State University, a Masters degree in Educational Administration and Bachelor degree in Political Science from University of North Carolina at Pembroke.



Dr. Robin McCoy, Standards and Assessment, Race to the Top Project Coordinator, NC Department of Public Instruction – Dr. McCoy spent many years as a teacher, principal and central office administrator providing leadership for all instructional services, including preK-12 instructional programs, federal programs, special education, student services, Section 504, gifted education, technology services, testing and accountability, ESL, Race to the Top, professional development, AdvancEd accreditation, and curriculum and instructional resource development. Dr. McCoy holds a PhD degree in Curriculum and Instruction from UNC-Chapel Hill and Masters and Bachelor degrees in Special Education from the University of Georgia.



Olivia Paige Richardson, 2013 Miss Indian North Carolina – Olivia Richardson, of Hollister, NC, is a member of the Haliwa-Saponi Tribe. She is the reigning Miss Indian North Carolina 2013-2014 promoting "Cultural Involvement & Being the Perfect Role Model." A 2009 graduate of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, Olivia recently graduated magna cum laude from East Carolina University with a Bachelor of Science in Business

Administration. She is now at ECU pursuing her Master of Science in Accounting, with hopes of becoming a Certified Public Accountant. Olivia has been a dedicated member since Spring 2010 of Sigma Omicron Epsilon Sorority, Inc, the Native American sorority founded at East Carolina University. She also is committed to the East Carolina Native American Organization, serving two different terms as the Co-President.



Nadine Patrick, Singer and Songwriter – Nadine Patrick is the Career Technical Education secretary at Columbus County Board of Education in Whiteville, NC. She also serves as Chairperson for the East Columbus High School Advisory Council and is the District 13 President of the North Carolina Association of Educational Office Professionals. Nadine is married and has two children. She is a Gospel Music singer and songwriter and has recorded eleven projects. She is a member of the Waccamaw Siouan Tribe. In March of 2012, she was inspired to write and record a song about our native people, the eight State Recognized Tribes of North Carolina. She wrote and recorded "We're Still Here" and hopes that it will educate others and encourage us all to be proud to be Native American.



Paulette Davis, Team Leader, Office of Indian Education, U.S. Department of Education – Paulette Davis was selected in December 2009 as Formula Grants Team Leader for the Office of Indian Education. In this capacity, Ms. Davis participates in activities related to grant making, grant monitoring and program reporting. Ms. Davis has been with the Department of Education since August 2000. Prior to federal service, she served eight years as a Youth Development specialist for the Public Schools of Robeson County, North Carolina. Ms. Davis received a Bachelor's of Science degree in Business Administration from Catawba College in Salisbury (NC) and continued classes in Education from University of North Carolina at Pembroke. She is an enrolled member of the Lumbee Tribe of North Carolina.



Dr. Loretta Hagen, Literacy Coach, Southern Regional Education Board – Dr. Hagen received her Bachelor of Science in elementary education from the University of North Carolina at Pembroke and a Master of Arts degree from the University of South Carolina. She also holds an Ed.D. in School Administration. Dr. Hagen has experience as a classroom teacher, principal and curriculum specialist at the local district level and is currently serving as a literacy coach for the Southern Regional Board of Education in Atlanta, Georgia.



Marvel A. Welch, Eastern Band of Cherokee, Governor's Office – Marvel Andrea Welch is from the Wolfetown Community located on the Qualla Boundary in Cherokee, North Carolina. Marvel believes that everyone is a leader and you choose how to model leadership in the way you give back to your community. Marvel's education includes from Southwestern Community College: Applied Science Degrees: Substance Abuse Counseling, and Health and Human Services. Western Carolina University, Cullowhee North Carolina a Bachelors' of Science in Social Work, and a Bachelor's of Applied Science degree in Criminal Justice. University of Tennessee, Knoxville she holds a Master's in Clinical Social Work. Currently Marvel is working on her PhD in Public Health from Walden University. Marvel currently serves on several Commissions and Boards that focus on Indian Affairs.

The Haliwa-Saponi Dance Team represents not only the Haliwa-Saponi Tribal School but also the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe. It is comprised of students ranging from grades 1-12. Under the supervision of Mrs. Gwen Richardson, these students share their rich cultural heritage through traditional dances. These students have traveled locally and state wide educating people about their tribe, culture and breaking down stereotypes.
