



COMPARISON OF HIGH SCHOOL AND MIDDLE GRADES ENROLLMENT



CTE CONCENTRATORS ARE COLLEGE AND CAREER READY

NC secondary Career and Technical Education (CTE) empowers students to be successful citizens, workers and leaders in a global economy. CTE served 809,559 enrollees (grades 6-12) in 2009-2010 by preparing them for high-wage, high-skill, and high-demand occupations and further education.
